Parishes all over the country are celebrating the *Year of Faith* proclaimed by Pope Benedict XVI, from Oct. 11, 2012 to Nov. 24, 2013, with pilgrimages to various places such as Rome, Kyiv, Lviv, Poland, Slovakia, the Czech Republic

and several other sites. This year, the Ukrainian Catholic Church is also celebrating 1025 years of Christianity in Ukraine with pilgrimages. In the last twenty-two years, we have had many others who have shared this covenant with the Sisters. Some, for a short time, others until they were called to eternity.

At present there are twenty-three Lay Associates who share in the work and prayers of the Sisters Servants, according to the ideals of our Founders: A life centered in Christ, nourished in prayer and in the Spirit of the Gospel, offering service to those most in need.

Sister Tharasia Hladio, SSMI - "With All My Heart"

I, Sister Tharasia, was known by many in my hometown of Ambridge, PA as Mary Hladio. My parents, Andrew and Catherine (Winiarchik) Hladio, brought eight children into the world of which I am the fourth, middle child.

I grew up in a loving family with my brothers -+Michael, +Nicholas, William, and baby +Nicholas, who died at the age of one year. - my loving sisters - Ann, +Louise, and Sophie, - and so my loving nieces, nephews, great-nieces and great-nephews.

Early childhood and growing up years were spent going

to the local school of Anthony Wayne and Junior High and working at Bells' Men's Department Store in Ambridge. I entered the convent at the age of 21 where further education was continued and completed at the university.

I met our sisters, the Sisters Servants of Mary Immaculate, for the first time when Sisters Lawrence and Andrea came to work in our St.

Peter and Paul parish in 1940. At that time there was no parochial school as yet. Sisters taught after school from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m., five days a week. They also took perfect care of our church including decorating for Christmas and Easter. Sisters organized the Altar Boys and Marian Sodality who always helped the Sisters to work in church.

Besides teaching and caring for our church, Sisters visited the sick, helped the needy and were very kind to all, especially the elderly. Sisters worked quietly and always appeared absorbed in prayer. They not only taught catechism, but the girls were also taught to cross-stitch. Everyone was taught Liturgical singing, folk songs were sung, and plays were performed for special occasions. Watching the Sisters do this fascinated me, and

within two years I had a strong desire to lead a life like our Sister Lawrence and Sr. Andrea.

When Sister Thomas, then Dorothea Hrynewich, and Anna Duda announced they were leaving to become sisters – I was surprised. After they left for the novitiate, my desire to be a Sister Servant became stronger!

Eventually preparations were made, and I was on my way to Mundare, Alberta, Canada. Upon receiving my first vows and later final vows, I taught in the following elementary schools throughout all of our diocese in the United States: Wilkes Barre,

Marion Heights (Mount Carmel), Shamokin and Philadelphia, PA; Detroit, MI; Chicago, IL; Buffalo, New York; Elizabeth and Passaic, NJ.

I also was missioned in the Mundare, Alberta orphanage and was prefect of high school girls in Yorkton, Saskatchewan, and St. Mary's Villa in Sloatsburg, New York, where I am at the present time. Presently St. Mary's Villa is a Retreat House where I, along with other sisters, welcome all denominations of people and religious of every rite hosting them for weekends or

weeks at a time.

I am grateful to my Superiors for giving me the opportunity to attend Meadville College (St. Joseph's Teacher's College) in Buffalo from where I graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education and where throughout my many years have received various certificates in Education, Catechetics, and Theology.

I have always enjoyed working with children and people. For me it is a great privilege and honor to serve Christ. I have tried to serve my God with all my heart. I hope and pray that those whom God inspires with a vocation to the Religious Life or Priesthood would have the courage answer this wonderful call from God!
